

"Our culture is stored as data in the land. Minnesota, the traditional homelands of the Dakota people and the Dakota land maps I create teach all about the



relationships and histories that are embedded as geographical data in the land, by reclaiming the Dakota names to these places. We didn't have a written language prior to the arrival of Europeans, instead we used our language and oral traditions to maintain a close connection with the natural world as land-based education. These geographical knowledge systems and the Dakota culture are so closely intertwined, that's simply known as a way of living, passed down through the generations." - "The truth about U.S. Indian boarding schools has largely been written out of the history books." Read the 2014 Native Youth Report which states:
 - More than one in three American Indian and Alaska Native children live in poverty.
 - The American Indian/Alaskan Native high school graduation rate is 67 percent, the lowest of any racial/ethnic demographic group across all schools. And the most recent Department of Education data indicate that the Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) schools fare even worse, with a graduation rate of 53 percent, compared to a national average of 80 percent.

- Suicide is the second leading cause of death—2.5 times the national rate—for Native youth in the 15- to 24-year-old age group.

- ❖ Just Words: The Problem with the Language of the "Other" Just Words in Community Service & Engagement. This video took place at the 2020 Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice. Language of "the other" is found throughout community-based learning and service. It is often intended to highlight social injustices, but also reinforces a "savior mentality" that minimizes community capacity. Other approaches are surface level kinship frameworks, minimizing the reality of privilege. How do we find just language to talk about the realities of difference without diminishment?
